JUNIOR CAMPUS - SCIENCE Melanie Attwood


This term in Science, our students have been diving into the exciting world of forces and energy. It's all about having fun in science whilst learning!

The Year 1/2s have had a blast exploring pushing and pulling—squishing playdough, making a crocodile, and testing their paper aeroplanes to see how air resistance and gravity affected their flight. The smiles on their faces while learning was awesome!

Meanwhile, our Year 3/4s have been developing their investigative skills by planning and conducting fair tests. They explored friction by measuring how far toy cars travel on different surfaces and tested air resistance by timing how long paper helicopters take to fall with added weights. Their curiosity and teamwork have made for some fantastic discoveries!

In the Year 5/6, it's been all about energy—especially electricity! The students have mastered the components of circuits and confidently built a complete circuit with a lamp. They've also investigated conductors and insulators, testing which materials allow electricity to flow. The hands-on project kits and interactive iPad simulations have been a real hit, sparking plenty of "lightbulb moments" (literally and figuratively!).

It's been an action-packed term full of discovery, creativity, and lots of scientific fun!



re-charge as it's crucial to mental health and overall well-being.


